Analysis I. Violations

539 Lawsuits

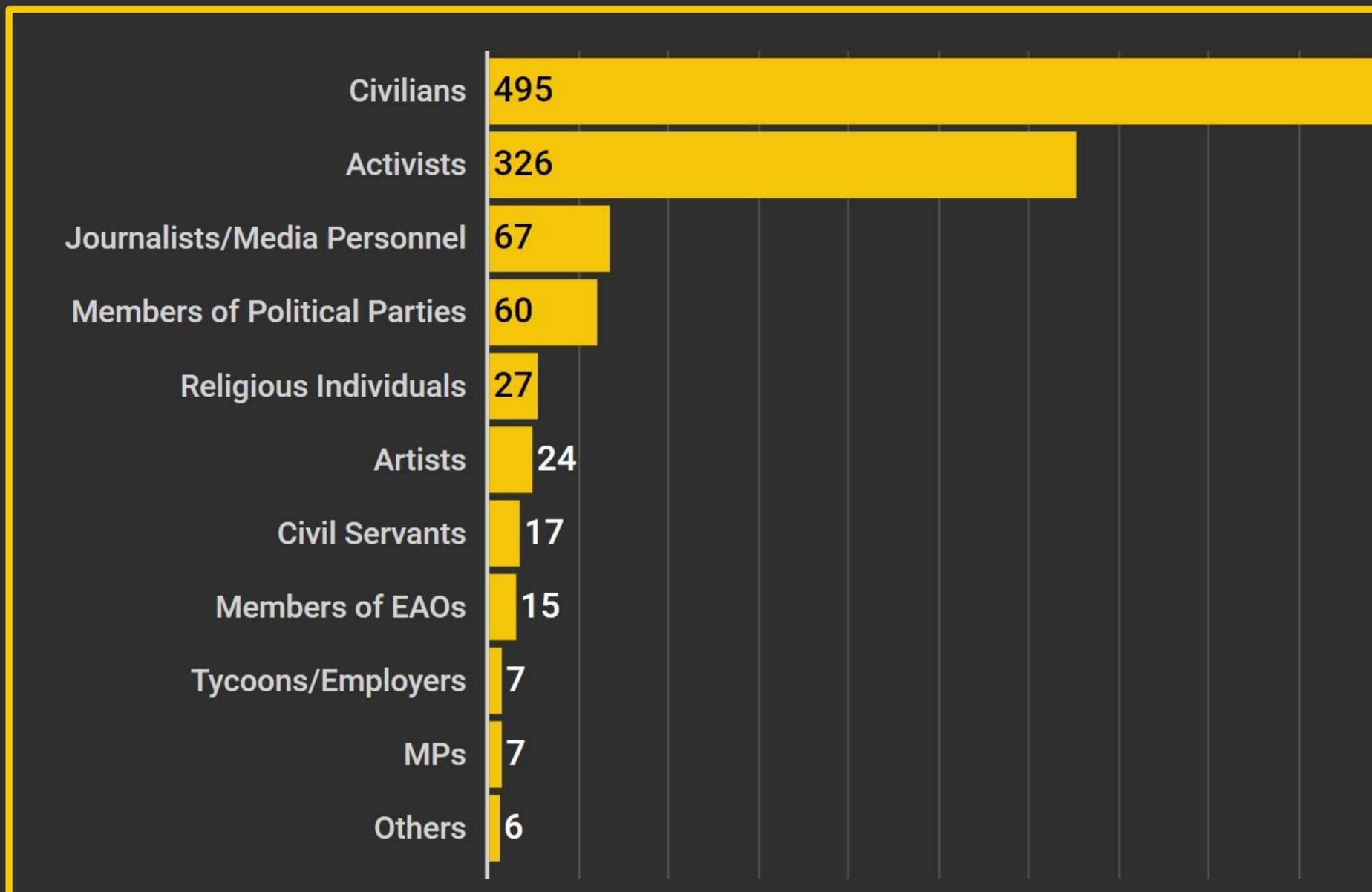
1051 Individuals

There are at least 539 lawsuits, in which several laws and legal provisions that are repressive to freedom of expression were used, against no less than 1,051 individuals.

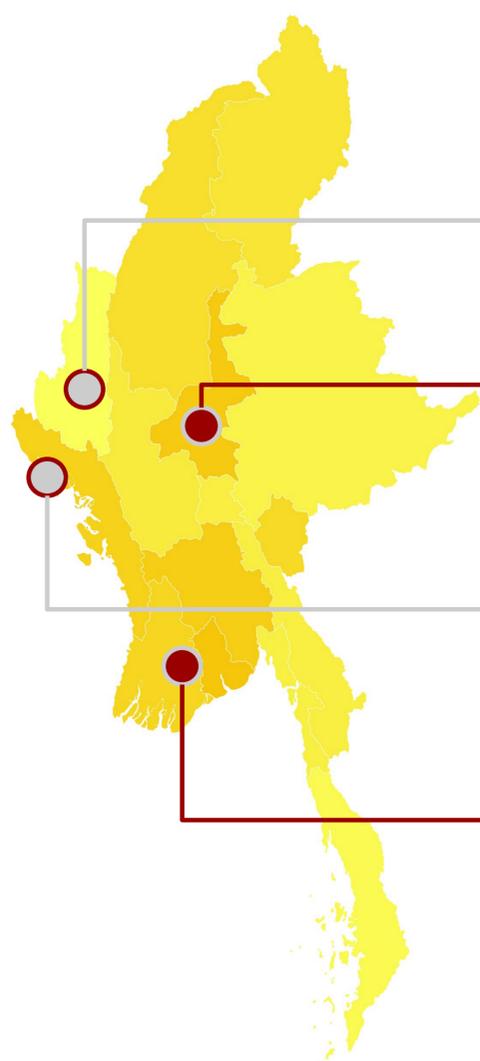


Athan – Freedom of Expression Activist Organization

Chin State is the only area where no such lawsuits are found.

Mandalay Region has the second highest number of free expression violations in the whole country.

Rakhine State has the highest about of cases of free expression violations among all States in the country.

Yangon Region is ranked at the top with the highest number of free expression violations in the whole country.

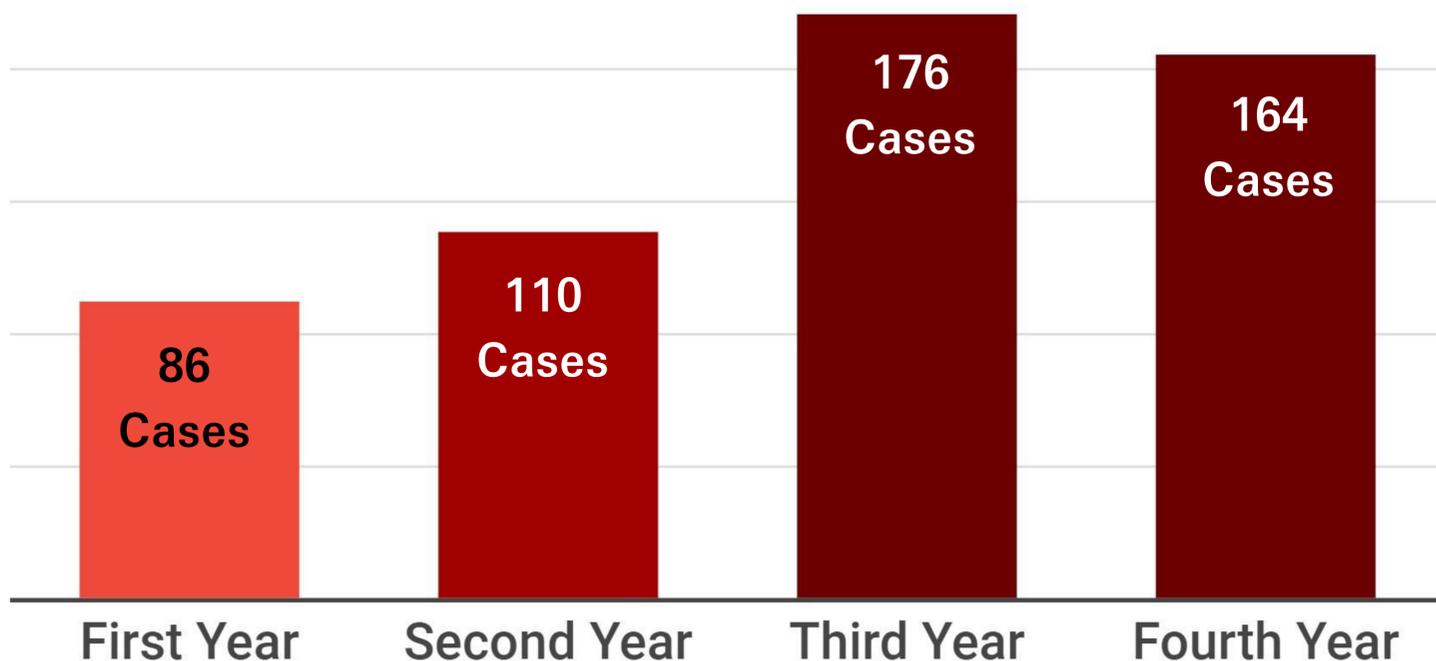

Lawsuits filed by the government officials such as police officers and civil servants, violating freedom of expression

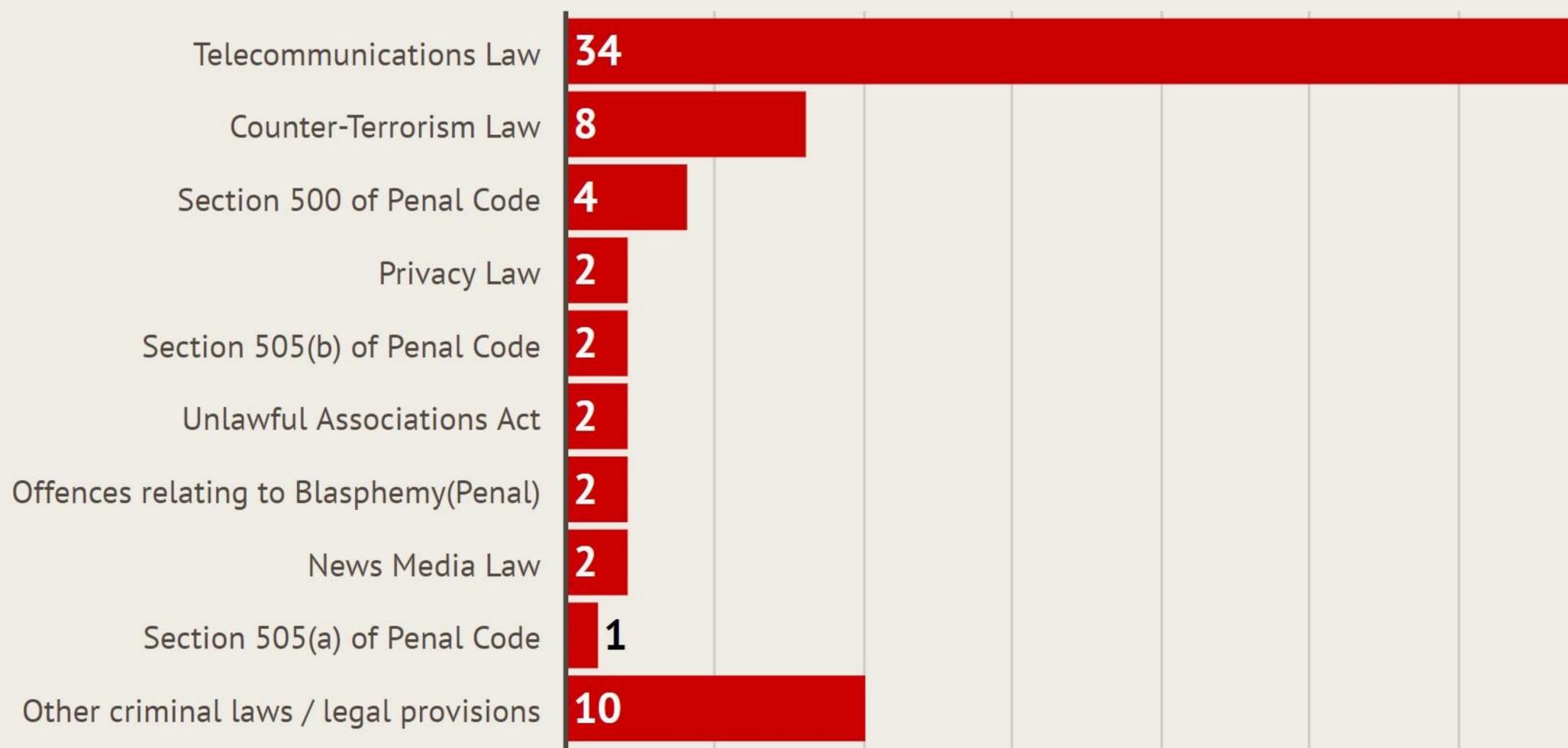
Lawsuits filed by political parties and pro-government individuals over criticism of government

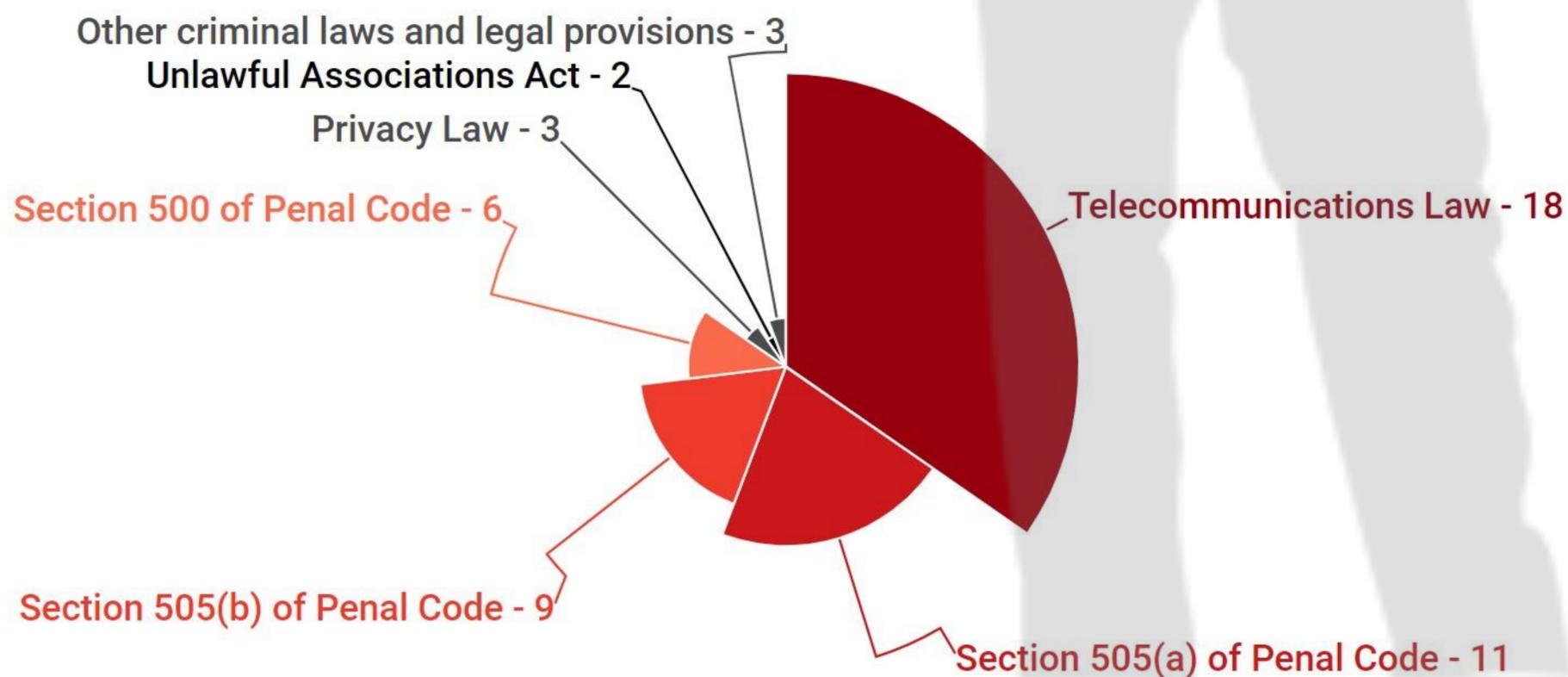

Tatmadaw filed 52 lawsuits violating freedom of expression in the past four years. In some cases, the Police filed lawsuits against individuals for criticising Tatmadaw or exercising the right to protest instead.

48% of the Tatmadaw's lawsuits is against criticism of the Tatmadaw on social media and other digital platforms while 52% is against offline criticism.

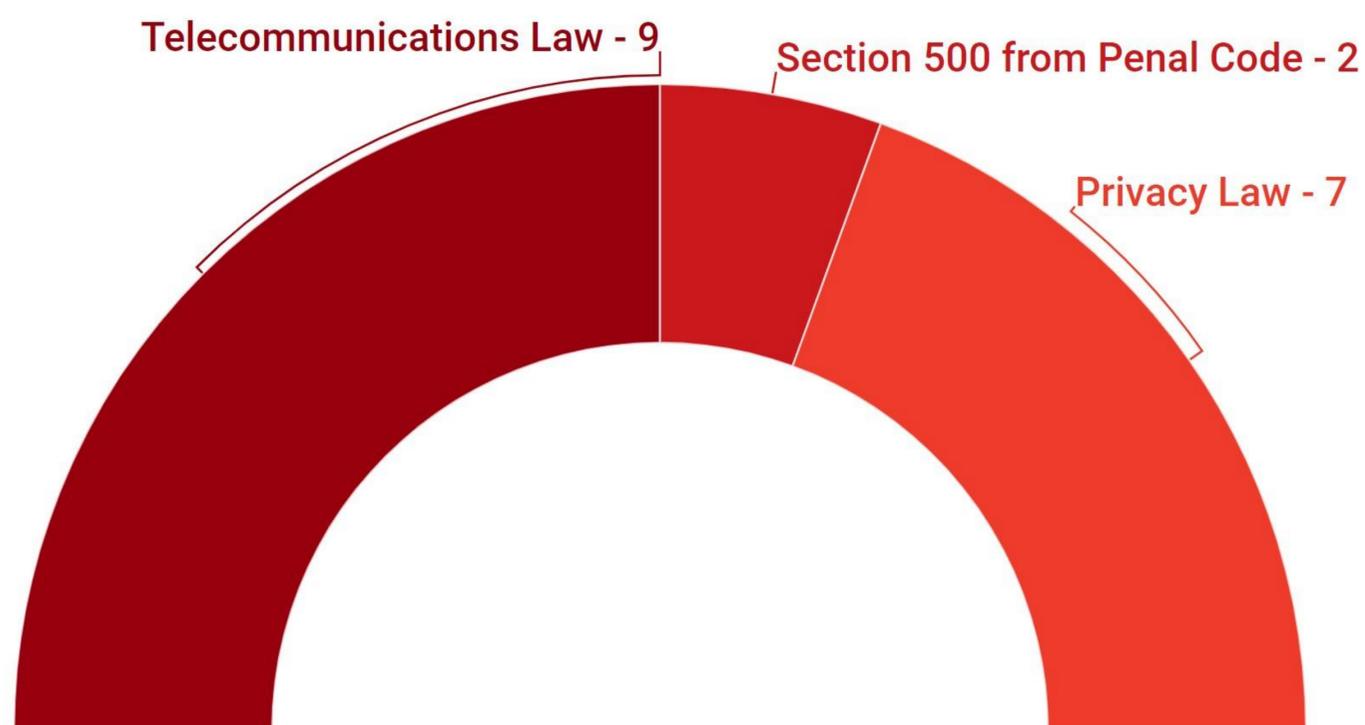


[Chart – Number of the Tatmadaw's lawsuits and several laws used in the lawsuits]

Analysis VI: Parliamentarians' Violations

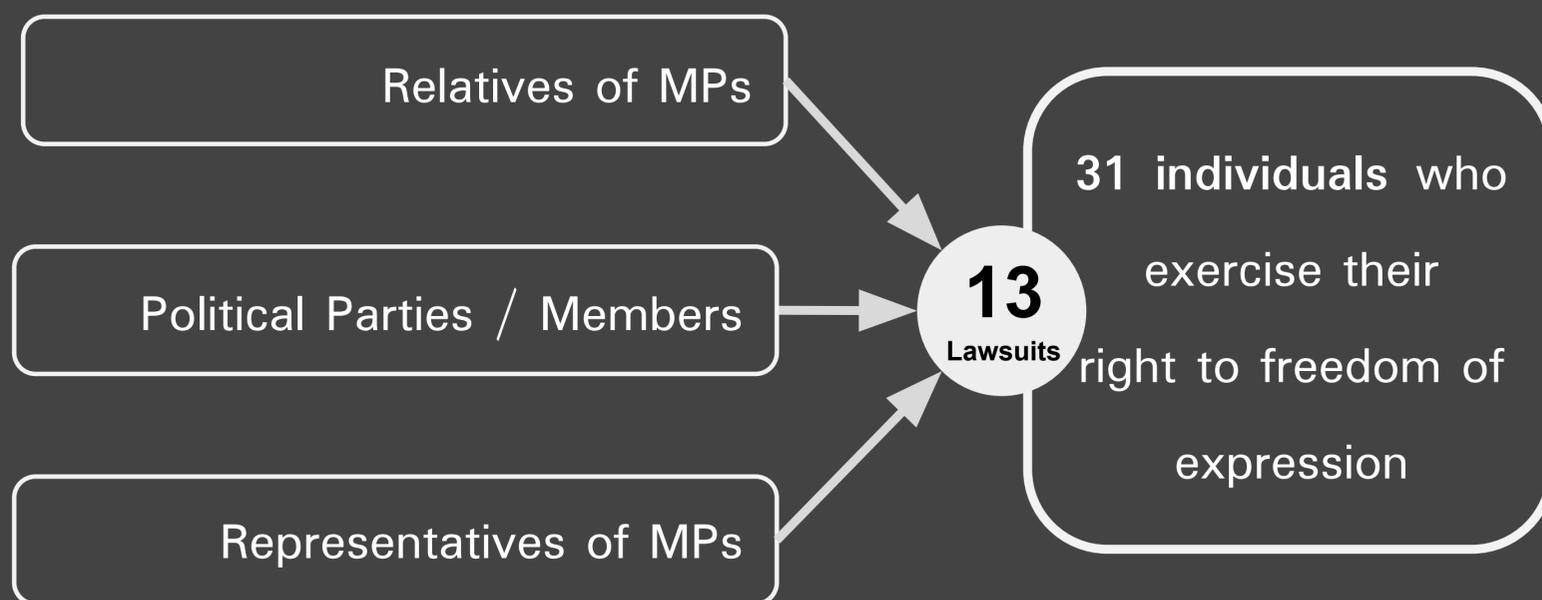


14 parliamentarians used defamation laws to file lawsuits against 35 individuals. Some were sentenced to two-year imprisonment.

31 individuals faced 13 lawsuits filed by third-party complainants because they criticized, protested or sent complaints against parliamentarians.



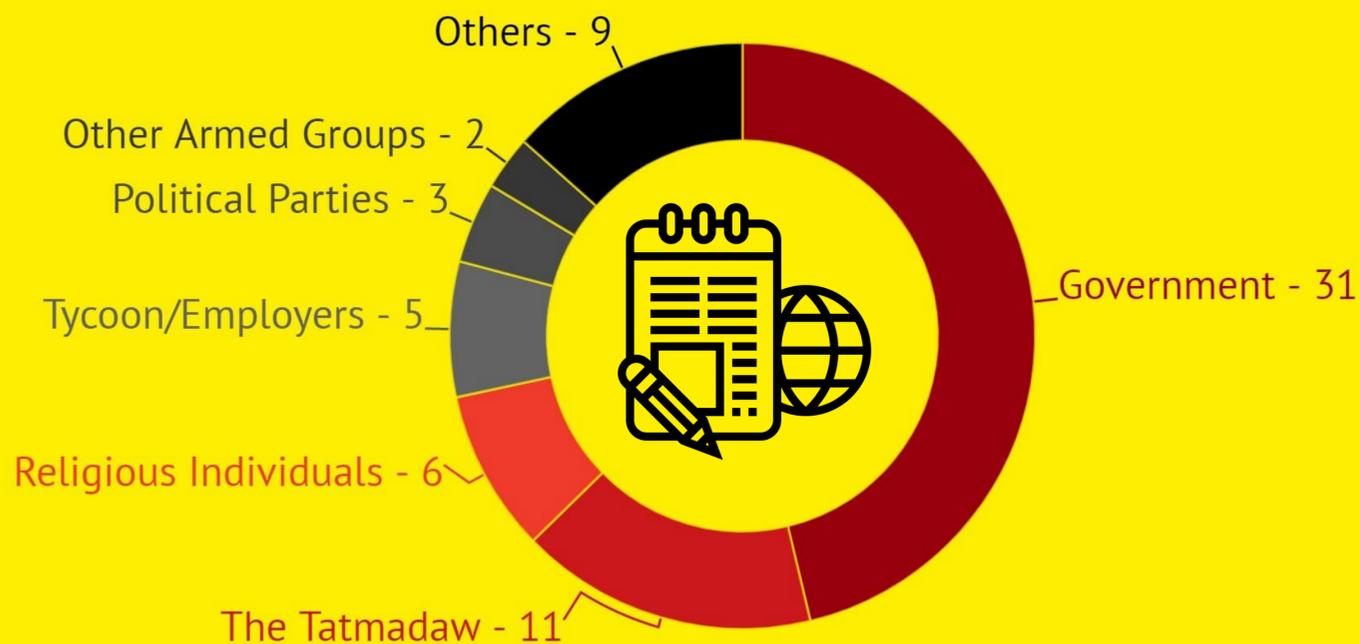
Analysis VII: Media Freedom

There are dozens of violations of media freedom under the current regime. There are 67 lawsuits against 67 journalists.

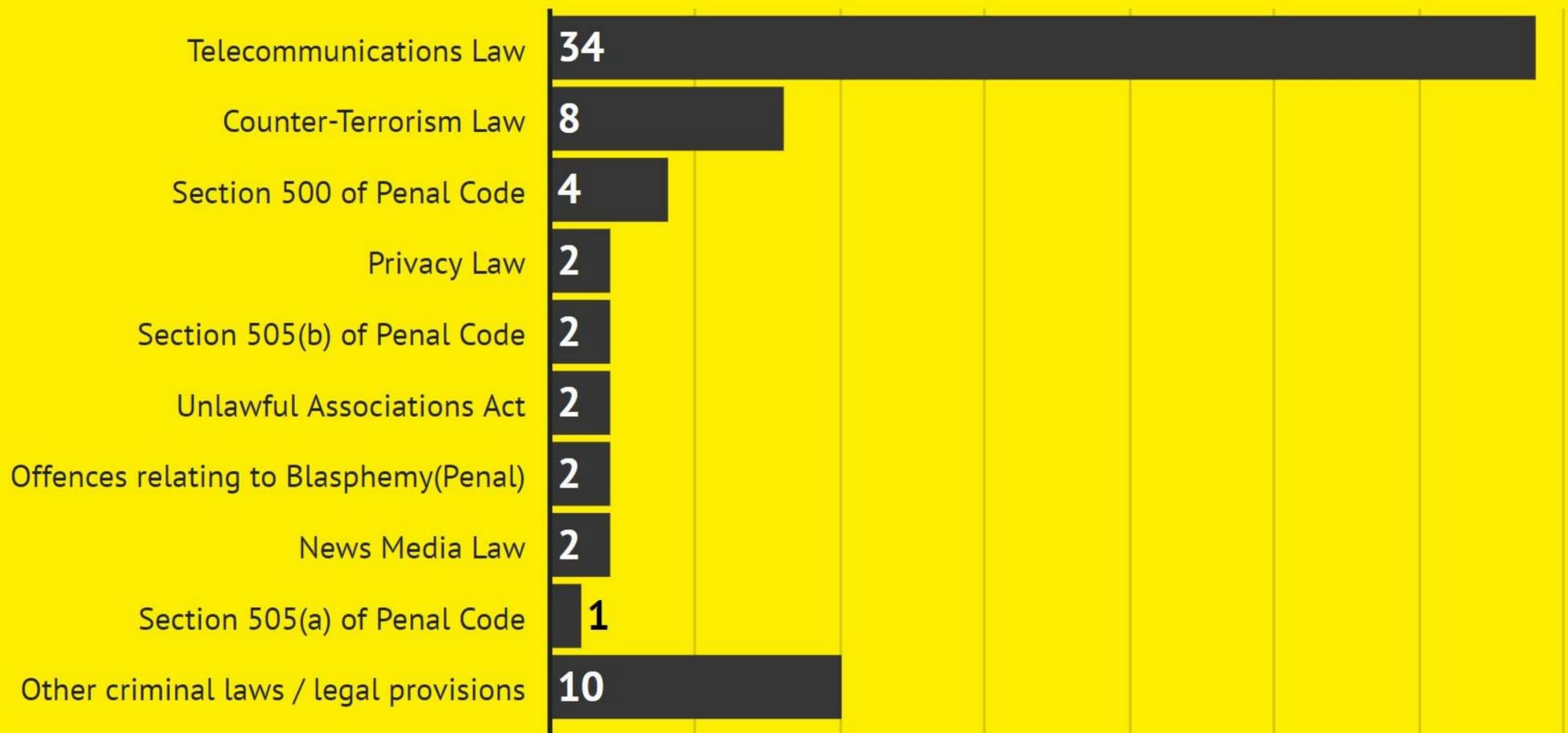
Ko Nanda, Channel Mandalay journalist was prosecuted and sentenced to two years in prison for covering protests in 2019. He is still in prison.
